& The second largest and fastest growing criminal industry in the world

#### INTERNATIONAL SCOPE OF TRAFFICKING

The International Labour Organization estimates that there were **40.3 million** victims of human trafficking in the world in 2016

- % Estimated 20 million victims of labor
  trafficking
- % Estimated 4.8 million victims of sex
  trafficking
- K Estimated 15.4 million people living in forced marriage

### TRAFFICKING VICTIMS PROTECTION ACT (TVPA)

Signed into law in October of 2000

Legal Definitions:

& Sex Trafficking is defined as the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act, in which a commercial sex act is induced by <u>force</u>, <u>fraud</u>, or <u>coercion</u>, **or** in which the person forced to perform such an act is under the age of 18 years.

**Labor Trafficking** is defined as the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of <u>force</u>, <u>fraud</u> or <u>coercion</u> for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage or slavery.

# JUSTICE FOR VICTIMS OF TRAFFICKING ACT (JVTA)

& Signed into law on May 29, 2015

**≥** Federal fine of \$5,000

& Creates the Domestic Trafficking Victims' Fund

& Establishes the United States Advisory Council on Human Trafficking



#### STATE LAW - END DEMAND ACT (2014)

& Increases the penalty for purchasing sex from a minor to a felony

& Requires offenders of a child (<15 years) or an individual with developmental disabilities to register as sex offenders

& Broadens Ohio's definition of trafficking to include fraud

& Terminates parental rights for those found trafficking their children or other minors

Four charged with human-trafficking organization that brought Guatemalan minors to work on Ohio egg farms



The trafficking conspiracy began in 2011 when the defendants and others brought the workers as young as 14 to the United States under the false premise that they would attend school, according to a news release from the U.S. Attorney's Office.











#### LABOR TRAFFICKING: VULNERABILITY FACTORS

High unemployment
Poverty
Crime
Discrimination
Corruption
Political conflict
Cultural acceptance of practice

### FORMS OF LABOR TRAFFICKING

#### Forced Labor

- & Victim forced to work against their will
- & Threat of violence
- & Freedom restricted
- & Degree of ownership

#### <u>Debt Bondage</u>

- & Victims must reimburse his/her traffickers
- & Amount to be repaid set by the trafficker
  - K Amount to be repaid is always increasing so the victim can never fully repay the trafficker

#### Child Labor

- & Work likely to be hazardous to the health and/or development of children
- ≥ 246 million exploited children between 5-17 years of age (ILO)

#### ≥139 goods produced in 75 countries

#### SEX TRAFFICKING

#### Commercial sex act induced by force, fraud or coercion

#### SEX TRAFFICKING BY THE NUMBERS IN THE U.S.

⊘Over 28,000 cases of sex trafficking reported to the National Human Trafficking Hotline from 2007-2017 ≈ 6,081 cases of sex trafficking reported in 2017; 288 were from Ohio ≈ More than 1,600 survivors reached out for help in 2015

@24% increase over 2014



### SEX TRAFFICKING BY THE NUMBERS IN THE U.S.

& In 2017, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children

responded to 10,093 reports regarding possible child sex trafficking

≥ Of the nearly 25,000 runaways reported to NCMEC in 2017, 1 in 7 were

likely victims of child sex trafficking

× 88% of these were in the care of social services when they went
 missing



#### FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH DOMESTIC MINOR SEX TRAFFICKING

- & Runaway children
- & Adult prostitution markets
- **\overline Prior history of sexual abuse**
- & Poverty





#### **RECRUITMENT INTO SEX TRAFFICKING**

& Malls, corner stores
& Streets
& Friend's house
& Truck stops
& Sporting events
& Outside juvenile justice center
& Online gaming communities





#### FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH DOMESTIC MINOR SEX TRAFFICKING

- & Large numbers of unattached/transient males
- **<u>&</u>** Membership in gangs
- & Promotion of child prostitution by
  family/friends
- **&** Organized crime







#### TRAFFICKERS EXPLOIT VULNERABILITY

¿ Identify vulnerable
¿ Befriend them
Show love and affection
¿ Isolate from family/friends
¿ Control/exploit

☆ Masters of the art of seduction
☆ Torture tactics
☆ Physical
☆ Psychological

#### TERMINOLOGY

- ☆ "The Stable", "The Family" ~ The circle of women being commercially sexually exploited
- ☆ "He was just a John/trick/date" ~ Male paying for sex from a woman who is being commercially sexually exploited
- ☆ "Dope boy"; "Boyfriend"; "Dad"; "Brother" ~often play the role of a pimp/trafficker
- & All social media sites can be used by traffickers (i.e. Backpage, Kik, Snapchat, and Facebook)



#### HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN OHIO

"Ohio is not only a destination place for foreign-born trafficking victims, but it's also a recruitment place" -Celia Williamson, associate professor University of Toledo





#### HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN OHIO

In 2016 and 2017, Ohio reported the fourth highest number of human trafficking cases to the National Human Trafficking Hotline

#### **EXAMPLES OF TRAFFICKERS**

David Nelms:

≥ 39 year old from the North Side of Columbus

& June 2013: 12 year sentence for forcing drug-addicted women into prostitution

**& Upscale hotels in Delaware and Franklin counties** 



#### EXAMPLE OF THE BUYERS

One 2012 human trafficking case in Toledo identified:

- ℵ A member of the Toledo Opera Guild
- $\ge$  A business man
- **∦**A lawyer
- 🔀 A builder

There is no profile for a buyer of commercial sex



#### THE IMPACT OF TRAFFICKING ON VICTIMS

"They didn't see us as human beings, but just as wh\*r\*s, just as flesh that they could use. That's all."

Punched	74%
Beaten	69%
Kicked	68%
Forced unprotected sex	68%
Threatened with a weapon	66%
Strangled	54%
Abused by person of authority	51%

Any physical health problem	99%
Neurological	92%
General Health	86%
Injuries	69%
Cardiovascular/Respiratory	69%
Gastrointestinal	62%
Dental	54%



Psychological Health Problems

### ANY CONTACT WITH HEALTH CARE?

# 88%

Had contact with some form of health care One Assessment of Emergency department personnel demonstrated

- **13%** felt confident in identifying a victim
- **3%** had training



### **HEALTH CONCERNS**

⊘Preventive health care non-existent
⊘Health problems not treated in early stages *XTend to fester until they become critical, life-endangering situations* 



### PHYSICAL HARMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Older broken bones
Bed bugs
Traumatic brain injury
Burns, bruising, bite marks
Rape, vaginal/anal tearing
Stab wounds, torture

& Reproductive Health Problems
& Alcohol/drug use
& Chronic back, visual or respiratory problems

### HEALTH ISSUES ASSOCIATED WITH VICTIMS

**&** Malnourishment

**&**Poor dental hygiene

&Unusual infectious diseases May not have had immunizations

### **IDENTIFYING VICTIMS**

& Frontline health providers play an important role

& Many victims are in plain sight

**&** Opportunities to intervene:

<u>X Law enforcement & Health care</u>





### IDENTIFYING VICTIMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- & Accompanying person seems controlling
- & Physical abuse
- & Submissive or fearful
- 🔌 Withdrawn
- **δ** Inconsistent history
- & Repeated STI testing
- & Discloses many sexual partners
- & Addiction
- **&** Communication difficulties
  - Language Barrier (Do not let a family member interpret when asking screening questions)
- & Lack of identification





### BARRIERS TO IDENTIFICATION

Watched, escorted or guarded
Coached answers
Unaware of what is being done to them is a crime
Loyalty toward trafficker as coping mechanism





### BARRIERS TO IDENTIFICATION

Moved frequently
Fear for safety of family
Fear and shame
Self-blame, hopelessness
Dependent on trafficker

### **COMMUNICATING WITH VICTIMS**

№ If you choose to question a potential trafficking victim:
 ※ Isolate without raising suspicions

& Many require an interpreter





### **COMMUNICATING WITH VICTIMS**

#### &Strict confidentiality

X Ask questions in safe, confidential and trusting environment
Limit number of people in contact with victim

#### &Indirect and sensitive

May deny being a victim, so best not to ask direct questions
Phrase "trafficking victim" will have no meaning



### **COMMUNICATING WITH VICTIMS**

&Questions to ask:

- **≥** Can you leave your job or situation if you want?
- ☆Can you come and go as you please?
- ≥ Have you been threatened if you try to leave?
- ≽ Have you been physically harmed in any way?
- **What are your working or living conditions like?**
- ≥ Have you ever had to exchange sex for food, shelter or drugs?



### **COMMUNICATING WITH VICTIMS: MESSAGES**

& Gaining victim's trust

& Support the patient's choice

ℵ Ask if he or she would like help, don't just assume

& Sample messages to convey:

*₭ We are here to help you* 

X Our first priority is your safety

**We are not in the business of deportation** 

**We will give you the medical care that you need**
